Stanford University officials failed to persuade White House aides today to let Stanford govern President Reagan's proposed presidential library complex.

"We are continuing to discuss the matter," William Kimball, president of the Stanford board of trustees, said through a spokesman after a White House luncheon with Edwin Meese 3d, counselor to the President.

The issue is whether a public affairs center, part of the proposed library complex, will be governed by Stanford or by the conservative Hoover Institution on War, Revolution and Peace, which is semiautonomous.
